he chronicler's knowledge of the eighties is sketchy to say the least. It is hoped that by creating this chapter, the memories of those involved with the club at any point in the eighties will be triggered and enable this chapter to be fattened. The same is hoped for the chapters that describes the nighties and the two decades of the new millennium.

Again, the honour board is misleading. It states that Beverley Paul captained the Colts from 1980-82. But it has been confirmed by Paul and Kumar Ramanathan that the latter captained the club in the 1980-81 season. Paul has indicated that he captained the first team in the seasons following – 1981-82 and 1982-83, with Goonesena as his deputy in both seasons. The captaincy was handed to Carlton Bernardus for the 1983-84 season under controversial circumstances. Wirantha Fernando took over the captaincy in 1984-85.

It is hoped that players and those in the know will clarify matters when the chapters are placed on the web. This is one of many reasons why the chronicler is keen on receiving feedback from concerned persons and those in the know and is not rushing into publication.

According to present knowledge The Colts had six captains in the eighties, with two players captaining for more than one season. They were Beverley Paul (2) and W. Fernando (4).

#### Walwin Goonetilleke

Walwin Goonetilleke (1977-1982, 1984-88) was the President for most the decade. Mike Chanmugam was president in 1984 and G.M. Vasa was president in 1989.

Goonetilleke had the envious job of dealing with a player exodus and a move to take over the land that the Colts was located on. He is truly an unsung hero.

In a response to a query made by Trevor Jansz in 2004 Goonetilleke mentioned that the club had experienced fluctuating fortunes and always managed to keep its head above water. And he was one of the reasons why the club survived the bad times and has come out in a blaze of glory.

Goonetilleke handed over the reins to Goonasena (1990-1999) who paved the way for the Mathivanan (200-2013). Goonetilleke continued to hold many honorary positions within the club. Goonetilleke passed away in 2005 just before the revamping of the club house began in earnest. But he was involved in the club long enough to feel satisfied that the club was in good shape and had the potential to prosper.

The refurbished board room of the Colombo Colts Cricket Club, named after Walwin Goonetilleke, was ceremonially declared open by his widow Mrs. Doreen Goonetilleke on 31<sup>st</sup> August 2018, under the patronage of the current president, the office bearers and executive committee members, along with the patron and vice patron of the club. Mrs. Clare de Silva, widow of the late Brian de Silva, was also in attendance.

The chronicler knew Walwin Goonetilleke but never spoke to him after leaving the country. His wife and the chronicler's mother worked together at the Canadian High Commission.

Although it was the chronicler's father<sup>1</sup> who brought Goonetilleke to the Colts, he had very little idea of the degree to which Goonetilleke had immersed himself in the affairs of the club and the extent to which he had dedicated himself to its upliftment.

The chronicler spoke to his widow in 2016 and she explained how Goonetilleke used to order drinks for players after a day's play and engage in banter. He truly loved cricket and the Colts.

The recipients thought that George Chitty was behind the letters.

Goonetilleke was friendly with the Employers Federation crowd. They included Eardley Lieversz Snr, Ben Anandappa, Rajasooriya and one Speldewine. He was also in contact with planters such as Pan Dias and Gamini Jayawardene. They met at his place or at the Colts. It was Tita Nathanielsz who suggested that he put his hand up for the post of President.

He did a lot of free work for the club and jokingly referred to himself as being the charity commissioner. He wrote all the letters for the club and provided it with legal assistance. The chronicler believes that he wrote the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary publication. He was a born optimist who lived for the moment. He was a spendthrift and never had much money in reserve but brought up four children.

He was very friendly with club members such as M.W. Rajasingham and Lucky Heendeniya. Preethi Wijetilleke, A.B. Senaratne (Kalu Albert) and Uvais were other club members he was close to. He made his wife a life member when he was president.

He never made class distinctions. He bought everyone the best drink in the house, namely whiskey.

There are times when one wishes that a historical commenced earlier than it did because of the passing of those with the knowledge to benefit the researcher. The chronicler has found this to be the case with projects ranging from family history to local history. Walwin Goonetilleke would have been of immense benefit to the Colts chronicle. The chronicler would have loved to have had discussions with him.

#### **Cricketing achievements**

The 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary publication summarises the eighties as follows –

"Our Division I team led by Beverley Paul brought home the Rahuman Hathy Trophy for the second time in the 1981/1982 season. Our successes in these tournaments provided the necessary motivation for our Division I team to re-establish itself and the 1985/86 season saw the second occasion on which the Colts had fought their way up the ladder in the Division I tournament to end the season as runner up for the trophy ...."

#### Sorting news clippings

The chronicler's understanding of how the club fared in cricket in the early eighties is based on news clippings provided by Kumar Ramanathan, many of which are not dated.

Roy Dias joined the Colts in 1972 and was with the club for eight seasons. He moved to the SSC in 1980 and to the CCC in 1988. If a game is described as Dias's first game for the SSC or against his former club, one can assume that it took place in the 1980-81 season.

Any game that mentions Beverley Paul as captain clearly took place during the 1981-82 season. The last game for the 1982-83 season was the last game Paul played for the club, because of a change in employment which commenced the day after.

The photos are headlined by dates indicated by Ramanathan. He has provided two documents that contain news clippings, photos and comments.

Alston Mahadevan, who authored <u>The history of Sri Lankan international cricket</u>, provided useful corrections to match dates and club cricket organisational changes, that led to the restructuring of this chapter. Feedback such as this is invaluable when writing about seasons that haven't been accurately catalogued.

#### The 1980-81 season

Ramanathan has discarded his keeping gloves in the game against Bloomfield. The article refers to the game as a Sara game although since 1976-77 Sara had been substituted with Robert Senanayake.



They played in two groups of eight teams, with the top four teams in each group then proceeding to play each other for the Lakspray Trophy and the bottom four teams in the two groups playing for the Rahuman Hathy Trophy. So, the Rahuman Hathy Trophy was a sub first division trophy. But its advent, in the seventies, preceded the Laxspray trophy.

# Sahabandu ge

Evergreen Daya Sahabandu accomplished the greatest milestone by a Sri Lankan bowler but was made to pay a heavy price before he claimed his 1000th wicket in first class cricke; against the Celts at Have lock Park yesterday.

The 42-year-old left arm seamer bowled three spells before eventually snatching his dream wicket — that of 19-year-old Colts batsman Harsha Deepal who was not even born when he began his illustrious career.

Deepal was stumped off Saha-bandu's bowling shortly after lunch with Colts on 296 for four wickets during the bowler's 20th over at which stage he had conceded only 54 runs.

Sahabandu ended the day with figures of 1 for 114 from 35 overs as the Colts batsmen made merry against the Nomads attack.

Nomads skipper Jayantha Amerasinghe's gamble of invi-ting the Colts to bat when he won the loss failed to pay off as Colts rattled of 347 for seven by the close yesterday.


The Colts innings was boosted by some superb batting by skipper Beverly Paul who slammed 78 off 147 balls with nine fours in 198 minutes. This was followed by 49 with eight fours and a six by Lanka Perera, a hurricane 60 by Wirantha Fernando in 130 minutes with 10 fours and two sixes and Kumar Ramanathan's belligerent 97

not out in 188 minutes with 12 fours two sixes. Ramanathan was fortunate however to be dropped twice in his 60's off Daya Sahabandu, once at deep mid-wicket and again at first slip.

Jayantha Amerasinghe took the day's bowling honours with four for 98 off 38 overs. CHIEF SCORES:

Wirantha Fernando, Lanka Perera, Kumar Ramanathan, Beverley Paul and Harsha Deepal were in the top half of the national first division batting averages in mid 1982. They had better averages than the likes of Nirmal Hettiaratchy who was in the national side. When reference is made the final round matches one can assume that the averages refer to the 1981-82 season.



#### **Colts exodus**

Beverley Paul played his last game for the club at the end of the 1982-83 season in which he captained the club first XI. He changed employment which got in the way of his cricket career.

Ramanathan claims that he played for the Saracens in the 1982-83 season. This was the season in which Paul captained for the second time. Ramanathan claims that he left the club following the appointment of Bernardus to the captaincy of the first team. Since, Paul captained the club in the 1982-83 season Ramanathan must have left at the end of that season and played for the Saracens in the 1983-84 season.

After the conclusion of the 1982-83 season the outgoing President Walwyn Goonetilleke called for an annual general meeting, which was attended by very few cricketers. Ranjit Samarasekera stood up and nominated Carlton Bernardus for the position of first division captain and the motion was seconded by Gamini Goonesena. Kumar Ramanathan objected on the grounds that the traditional practice of players selecting the captain was not being followed. His objection was overruled and Bernardus was endorsed as captain.

Wirantha Fernando was a former U19 national captain. In the 1981-82 season he came third in the first division batting averages and was in line to take over the captaincy in 1983-84.

Ramanathan organised a cricketers meeting at which the objection to Bernardus' appointment gained overwhelming support. But although this was conveyed to club committee the decision regarding the appointment stood.

Ramanathan felt that the Colts were strong, and many players were interested in throwing their lot in with the Colts. He therefore felt that with such a strong player list it was inevitable that Bernardus would not be able to retain his place in the first team. Ramanathan had defended Bernardus at selection meetings and was instrumental in the latter being picked on and off for the first team. But he was never able to find a permanent place in the first team.

Ramanathan provided the new President Mike Chanmugan and the new committee with various options. One was to hold a players meeting and give the players a voice, and follow it up with an emergency general meeting where the players' decision was acted upon. Another was to exclude the captain from the selection process. None of these was agreed upon by the then Colts cricket secretary.

Hence, Ramanathan<sup>2</sup> was left with little option but to leave the club. And he was followed by six other players, namely, Srinath Silva, Mumtaz Yusuf, Lanka Perera, Ransiri Pieris, Ralston Burke and Sarath Fernando.

Yusuf joined the SSC. Ramanathan played a season with the Saracens and received a payment for the first time. Paul retired.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Ramanathan adds that none of his actions and comments should be construed as a personal vendetta against Ranjit or Carlton. Over the years he kept in close touch with both and acknowledges their contribution to the club in many ways, and their loyalty to it.

One cannot blame Kumar and his fellow dissidents for leaving because the chronicler entertained similar thoughts in 1971 when the club captains reported him to the general committee. Not unlike Ramanathan he felt that he was acting on principle, in that instance he was opposed to persons being picked for teams without attending practice. He was rooting for talented and enthusiastic youngsters who were being denied the opportunity to prove themselves by seniors whose commitment to the game was suspect to say the least.

#### **Aftermath**

But in cricket, as in life, there are no true villains. Villains can usually redeem themselves through good works. In the case of Colts those who left and those who stayed, never lost their love for the club. Those who left were disappointed that their views were not taken on board. Those whose actions triggered the exodus did not abandon the club in her hour need but worked to bring the club's cricket back to strength. This is no different to what took place in the early fifties.

As Ramanathan conceded years later the club exodus gave Bernadus the chance to build his own leadership method independent of interference. And Ramanathan expressed his pride in what Bernardus has achieved for the Colts and cricket in general. From the fifties onwards the club has been strengthened by individuals who have persevered amidst sporadic bouts of adversity.

Carlton is still with the club. Ranjit passed away in 2017 ending an association with the club exceeding 50 years. They are, and were, true Colts stalwarts, who saw the club through the hard times and can share credit for rebuilding the Colts. They had to pick up the pieces and recruit from scratch and within 10 years the club won her first premier competition.

After becoming captain in 1984 Bernadus had to carry the can with Gamini Goonasena and a bunch of raw cricketers just out of school. But survive they did although lacking in finances.

Carlton brought Chaminda Vaas to the Club. And Ranjit was partly responsible for Nishantha Ranatunga joining the club. And Chaminda and Nishantha have made a huge difference to the club where its cricket and administration is concerned.

#### **Finding replacements**

Gamini Goonesena, Ranjit Samarasekera, Chanmugam the coach and Bernadus looked afar for fresh recruits. They came from Thurstan, Issipatana, St. Peter's, St. Joseph's, St. Thomas's, St. Anthony's, Prince of Wales, and Nalanda. Some of the players who arrived at the club were Oscar Wanigesekera and Harsha Deepal (Issipatana), Rupanath Wickremarartne (St. Sebastians), Premalal Fernando (Prince of Wales), Dashantha Gunawardene (St. Anthony's). All the newcomers had played under 19 representative cricket.

#### From 1983-84 onwards

Wirantha Fernando who captained the Colts in four Laxspray trophy competition games attended Prince of Wales' College, Moratuwa, captained the Combined Schools team in his youth. He represented the Sri Lanka Under-19 cricket team in a tour of Pakistan in 1976 and again in 1978, when the Australia Under-19 cricket team came to the island.

A right-handed middle-order batsman, Fernando played for the Colts Cricket Club throughout the 1980s. In the 1989/90 Lakspray Trophy, under the captaincy of Rupanath Wickramaratne, he scored his maiden first-class century, an innings of 111 against Moratuwa Sports Club at the Colts Cricket Club Ground. He was a politician and succumbed to his injuries following a mob attack in the Chilaw area which was a consequence of his car having an accident with two cyclists.

Wickramaratne handed the reigns over to Angelo Liyanage. An old Thomian, he played for the Colts in Laxspray Trophy (1988-89, 1989-90) and the Saravanamuttu trophy (1990-91). It was under his captaincy that Chaminda Vaas played in his first Sara game. (Vaas was brought to the Colts by Carlton Bernadus, his coach at St. Joseph's.)

#### Runners up

Amidst the drama the club picked up the pieces and were first division runners up in the 1986–87 season. The Colts met the SSC in the final. The Colts totalled 304 after losing its 5<sup>th</sup> wicket at 143 and 8<sup>th</sup> at 207. In reply, the SSC went one better and overhauled the Colts total on the back of a 132 run ninth wicket stand. This would have been extremely frustrating, let alone disappointing, for the Colts. However, five seasons later the Colts again met the SCC in a first division final. Again, the game was extremely close but on this occasion the Colts were not to be denied.

MR Farcy retired hurt in the Colts Cricket Club second innings having scored 5 (team score 9/1

The 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary publication mentions this achievement but carries no further details. Not even a summary of the season. By way of contrast there are two whole chapters dedicated to the time the Colts was narrowly edged out of the first division premiership in 1962-63. These are based on the scrapbook of Richard Alles and Darrell Lieversz and comments made by the latter on the final game of the season. Hopefully there are people who can still recall the 1986-87 season and are able to provide details of the key players and provide an explanation of how the season panned out.

Interestingly, despite the team coming second the club felt that a team photo was worthy. By contrast no group photo was taken of the 1962-63 team.

#### **Recent times**

The evolution of the club is one of concerned persons doing their bit to institute changes that may not be fully realised during their involvement in the club. For instance, the small changes which were the result Ramanathan's entreaties would have brought people to the club who otherwise wouldn't have. And some of these persons would themselves have instituted changes which attracted further individuals who made a difference. A few ripples triggered by dissenters turn into waves in the long term. The Colts is what it is today because throughout her history there were people who cared enough to cause a stir.

It is possible to draw a line connecting Kumar Ramanathan to Mathivalen. The former was instrumental in making the first XI a competitive force in in the mid- seventies. By restoring the reputation of the club, he attracted good cricketers to the club which had a snowballing effect down the decades. When Mathivalen came to make large-scale infrastructure changes the club was deemed worthy because of the success it was enjoying in cricket thanks to the big names who brought this about.

#### A takeover stalled

It now appears that the greatest threat to the Colts in the eighties came from external forces. Vimal Jayanetti has updated the chronicler on an incident which took place in the mid-eighties during the watch of Walwyn Goonetilleke.

About 1987-88 there was a strong move led by A. Polonowita and the Nawaloka Enterprise to take over all the Havelock Park clubs and convert them into one big sports complex. This move had the blessings of then powerful premier Premadasa.

In response, all three clubs rallied together and made a joint plea to President J.R. Jayawardena. Walwyn Goonetilleke from the Colts, Gamini Fernando from Havelocks and the BRC president (a Muslim) met with President JR at his residence.

Apparently, the Colts president wore his old college tie that day. The conversation regarding the matter at hand did not last 10 minutes with JR assuring that such a take -over would not take place while he was alive.

JR was more interested in talking about cricket and rugby, Royal and Trinity, than about the three clubs whose future was in jeopardy. For the first time in history the Colts, Havelocks and BRC members got together at gala dinner dance held at the Havelocks to celebrate this victory. The festivities went on till dawn.

I wonder whether Douglas Lieversz was in anyway involved in the overtures made to JR. There is no way in which JR would have allowed the club which his good friend from schooldays was associated with, to go under.

Walwyn Goonetilleke is arguably an unsung hero. Maybe his presence in the club kept the club from folding and triggered a renewal?

A cricketer who played alongside Polonowita in the national side, who only learnt about the incident in 2023, said he had lost all respect for Polonowita. F.C. de Saram once referred to Polonowita as Anuradhapura Polonnaruwa, poking fun at his name. While this was an expression of FC's class bias, any sympathy for Polonowita must be tempered by his dastardly plan which showed contempt for the interests of three clubs that had done so much to promote sport in the country, as well as demonstrating bureaucratic arrogance.

But the Colts didn't come out of the club totally unscathed. It lost the land where the former tennis courts were located on which residences for doctors now stands.

#### A time of transition

For most of the eighties the Colts was seen through the lens of the Taverners and perceived as a drinking club<sup>3</sup>. The club was going through a hand to mouth existence. Finances were down and the nets were in a bad state. The Colts kept going in the premier league with great difficulty. Trevor Rajaratnam, Ranjit Samarasekera and Carlton Bernardus worked hard to keep the club on an even keel. Mike Chanmugam coached the team voluntarily.

In the late eighties (probably in 1987), Mike Chanmugam retired from the coaching role and was replaced by Ranjit Samarasekera. From 1987 onwards the gradual turnaround had become entrenched. And this bore results in the nineties.

The Colts became less of a drinking club and more of a family club. The club culture began to change. Cricketers drank a lot less. And facilities began to show improvement although no details of where the changes took place are available.

The opportunity arose for the club's cricketers to play for the national team. The administration was driven by the objective to motivate players to represent the country.

Carlton Bernardus retired from competitive cricket in 1989 and concentrated on coaching. In 1990 he was coaching St. Joseph's and brought Chaminda Vaas over to the club. Samarasekera saw the talent in him and gave him a break in the first team<sup>4</sup>. Bernadus also brought Jerome Fernando and Shayne Brohier (St. Peter's), Oril de Mel and Vivian Perera (St. Joseph's captains) and Harsha de Silva (St. Joseph's), to the club.

Samarasekera transformed the whole team. He brought in players of repute to the club. Sanjeeva and Nishan Ranatunga joined the club. Arjuna Ranatunga almost did. (Sanjeeva left after four years.)

Good outstation cricketers joined the club. Duleep Liyanage was from Kalutara and Eric Upashantha was from St. Anne's, Kurunegala. By the turn of the new decade the net was being cast wider than it did in the mid-eighties.

#### **Club heroes**

When there was a split in the club in the fifties people like Trevor Jansz, Owen Kreltszheim, Douglas Lieversz, Clarence Schoorman, H.R.V. Elders and A.V. Fernando, rebuilt the club. In the eighties, Walwin Goonetilleke, Mike Chanmugam, Trevor Rajaratnam, Ranjit Samarasekera, Gamini Goonesena and Carlton Bernardus played a similar role. Under difficult circumstances they collectively kept the club going in the first division.

It is hard to say when the club culture appreciably changed. The club was first division runners up in 1986–87 and this couldn't have been achieved by a team in disarray. Without a scorecard it is not possible to determine whether the new recruits in the wake of the exodus had something to do with this. But it is highly probable that by the late eighties a certain *elan*, self-belief and a new approach to tackling on field challenges was developing. Maybe there were more cricketers with that "in your face" mentality that was pioneered by Kumar Ramanathan.
