## **REACHING THE PINNACLE**

n 1991-92 the Colts won a first division premiership for the first time. It also took out the premier trophy in 1999-2000. Hence it opened and closed the decade with first division triumphs.

In 1998-1999 Colts were the runners up in the premier league and premier league limited over champions.

The Colts had six captains in the nineties. All of them led the team once, except for Nishantha Ranatunga who captained the first team on four occasions. Ranatunga, along with two other SSC cricketers moved to the Colts following a dispute at the SSC.

Nishantha Ranatunga is the brother of former Sri Lankan cricket captain, Arjuna Ranatunga. The latter played all of his domestic cricket at the SSC, from 1982 to 2001.

For all of the nineties, Gamini Goonasena was the president of the club. He captained the team twice in the seventies.

The following anecdote sums up the changes taking place in Colts cricket. In 1990 the Colts played the SSC in the premier league semi-finals. Nishantha Ranatunge batted at no. 7 or 8 for the SSC. The next year Nishantha was batting higher up the order for the Colts. In a finals game against the SSC the Colts batted first and recovered from 12 for 3 to be all out for 220. The Colts won the game with Nishantha taking the last wicket and Sanjeeva taking the last catch.

The 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary publication has this to say about the nineties –

"The season 1991/92 saw the Colts achieve the pinnacle in Tournament Cricket when our team led by H.D. Hettiwatte became the Champions of Cricket winning the Division I trophy. In 1992 we were the Runner up in the Limited Overs Tournament and in 1996 Colts won the Under 24 Cricket Championship.

In 1996 our Captain of the previous year Chaminda Mendis batted his way into the record books in the country. Division I cricket was granted first class status in 1988/89 and in our Division I match against Rio Sports Club, Ambalangoda played on our Grounds on 7<sup>th</sup> January 1996 Chaminda with a century in the first innings and a double century in the second became the first to achieve such a feat in first class cricket in this country. Chaminda probably created a second record by being on the field throughout the entirety of the 3 days of the match except for a short break of 10 minutes."

What also needs mention is that in 1995 the club organised the tourney that enable women's cricket in Sri Lanka to finally take off. That in itself is a gesture of great importance in the development of cricket in Sri Lanka.

## First ever first division triumph

In 1992 the 25th Olympics Games opened in Barcelona, Bill Clinton was elected as the 42nd US President and America voted for either a young or old Elvis Presley to be used on a postage stamp.

In 1992 Windows 3.1 was released, Euro Disney opened, and rioting broke out in Los Angeles over the beating of black motorist Rodney King. The first nicotine patch is introduced to help stop smoking and DNA fingerprinting is invented. The continuing Balkan War for the next 3 years between Muslims, Serbs and Croats prompting UN intervention. And the Colts broke the first division premiership ceiling.

This would have been a very proud event for all, particularly Ranjit Samarasekera. He led the club to its first premiership, the Donovan Andree trophy. And he coached the club to its first division I trophy.

Samarasekera influenced the club's cricketing fortunes more as a coach than he ever did as a player, even as captain. As a coach he was innovative, bold and imaginative. He scouted for players rather than get the best out of players who arrived of their own accord.

Bernardus too has left his imprint on every facet of club activity. He has been captain, cricket coach, ground secretary, cricket secretary and general secretary.

# Summary

Man of the Match: D.K.Liyanage. Sinhalese Sports Club missed their four stalwarts, Arjuna Ranatunga, Asanka Gurusinha, Marvan Attapattu and Pramodya Wickramasinghe, all touring Pakistan at the same time. Though a four-day final, rain hampered the game and the winner of the trophy was decided on the first innings, where a keen tussle ensued with the Colts Cricket Club winning by a narrow nine run margin. Colts Cricket Club won the toss and on the second day staged a remarkable fight back, the last five wickets adding over 150 runs. Skipper Devapriya batted for 206 minutes and hit 10 fours. Samaraweera hit 8 fours in his stay of 176 minutes. Jayawardene fought bravely to hit 4 fours in his stay of over two hours and with Munasinghe added 65 runs for the ninth wicket

M.C. Mendis and N. Ranatunga appeared 5<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> respectively, in the national averages. D.K. Liyanage was placed sixth in the national bowling averages. This suggests that the performance of the team was very much a team effort with each player chipping in at critical moments over the season.

The 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary publication in which the above photo appears carries no information (subjective, descriptive/impressionistic) on the season itself. Hence, it isn't possible to detail how the season progressed and what its key moments were. Club specific averages are not provided. Such information would have given meat to the above photo and the national statistics which follow. It is a pity that the powers that were at that time weren't conscious of history and importance of cementing that moment for posterity.

When the Colts won the Donovan Andree trophy in 1972 the chronicler wrote an article which appeared in the Sunday Times. Richard Alles wrote a summary of the season for the centenary publication which also carried the averages of the players involved. Finally, the chronicler preserved press clippings from the season which appear in the chapter 43.

For all the available statistics and records, they need to be intertwined with anecdotal and subjective accounts in order to create a vivid picture of the dynamics of a season. For instance, what were the crucial games and individual performances that turned a season around? When did the momentum that propelled the team into the final commence and what factors triggered it? In preparation for the season were weaknesses considered and steps taken, such as recruitment, to alleviate them? What were the memorable catches? What were the successful strategies to curtail difficult batsmen? Were there batting performances played in difficult conditions, where skill rather than runs were oparamount. These are some of the observations that underwrite the rich tapestry of cricket writing.

BORN : 27 January 1974, Colombo. Playes for Sri Lanka in Tests & ODIs Left Hand Bat & Left Arm Fast Medium

Chaminda Vaas has been an integral part of Sri Lanka's upsurge in Test and one-day cricket of late. His incisive left arm pace bowling, which has invited comparisons with Wasim Akram, has given the attack the extra bite it had been missing previously. He was the first Sri Lankan to take 10 wickets in a Test match, and at 24, Vaas clearly has much to give to the future of Sri Lankan and world cricket. He is amongst the top ten in the pace bowling category in the World. It is sad to note that he is injury prone and missed out on some very vital matches for Sri Lanka.

He has been representing his club from the age of 13.

#### ROMESH SHANTHA KALUWITHARANA

BORN: 24 November 1969, Colombo Plays for Sri Lanka in Tests and ODIs Right Hand Bat & Wicket-Keeper

The diminutive right handed wicket-keeper batsman sometimes described as "Little" Kalu sparkled in the International scene during Sri Lanka's controversial tour of 1995 to Australia. Although he scored a scintillating century on debut against Australia in 1992, at the SSC, he had been unable to command a regular place in the side. However his tremendous success, both as a wicketkeeper and opener, on this tour and the subsequent performances in the Wills World Cup 96 has virtually ensured his continued presence. His exuberant, dashing style has won the hearts of many spectators around the world, and has now gone up a step ahead as a brilliant wicket-keeper in the recent past. After a demotion in the batting order, he has come back to the role of opener once again and has really done very well.

Dhamika Bulankulame and Thilan Samarasekera were also Colts cricketers who were in national contention. Bulankulame was a Thomian opener who scored a century in the Royal-Thomian of 1984. Samarasekera was an Anandian who played for the Colts and then the SSC, in the late nineties.

Harsha de Silva who played for the club in 14 first-class cricket matches between 1991 and 1996 went on have a successful career as a coach. He had two spells as the coach of the Sri Lanka women's national cricket team, first between 2010 and 2013 and later from 2018 to 2020. He has also mentored schoolboy cricketers in Sri Lanka and Australia

He was a junior level coach from 1996 to 2001 for his own school, Saint Joseph's College, Colombo, and became a professional school cricket coach for St. Joseph's College in 2001 and has mentored Angelo Mathews.

# Competitive across the decade?

The first season of the decade took place under the auspices of the Laxspray trophy and was won by the SSC. The next seven seasons were played for the reconstituted Sara trophy. The last two seasons were played under the premier league. The Colts won the second and last competitions played in the decade. Following the Colts triumph the following clubs took out the premiership in the following order. SSC, NCC, SSC/Bloomfield, CCC, Bloomfield, SSC Bloomfield. Hence, the SSC and Bloomfield fielded the strongest sides of the decade.

It would be interesting to know how competitive the Colts was across the decade. What were its rankings per season?

In 1996 the club won the under 24 championship. It is unlikely that the Sara and under 24 competition ran concurrently as the club Sara teams would have fielded players under 24. The following photograph of the 1996-97 first division team appeared in the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary publication and is reproduced below.

The significance of this photo is not known. But there are certainly cricketers of calibre in the side. The club may not have won the premiership but appear to be a very competitive side with Vaas and Kaluwitharne in it.

About this time Sri Lanka won the world cup. The chronicler never imagined that there would be any Colts cricketers in the team. He assumed that the club was lumbering along and not attracting ambitious cricketers to it. But he was unaware that things had changed.

The Colts was now an avenue through which cricketers could achieve greatness. And having made the national team there was no need to change clubs to retain one's position.

The chronicler cannot determine whether to what extent the club facilities had improved but clearly the club's cricketers had a developed a sense of purpose and a bold attitude.

There is a hint that money was coming into the club. The fact that Mathivanan is in the photo as a club sponsor says a million words.

## The 125th anniversary

In 1998 the search engine Google was founded, the FDA approved Viagra, Apple unveiled the iMac, the Maastricht Treaty came into force, the Yangtze River broke it's banks, there was a 66-day blackout in Auckland, and there were two terrorist bombing attacks on two US embassies. After many years of troubles in Northern Ireland both sides agreed to the good Friday peace agreement. The US President Bill Clinton denied he had "sexual relations" with former White House intern Monica Lewinsky, but later admited it. The Soviet Union Banking system sufferesd a meltdown when the rouble lost 70% of its value against US dollar in 6 months with several of the largest Russians banks collapsing.

Sonny Bono, Carl Perkins, Tammy Wynette, Linda McCartney, Frank Sinatra and Jerome Robbins passed away. Titanic was the first movie to hit the billion dollar mark. The soundtrack from the movie was the best selling album for the year.

## No photographic record

Photographs taken of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations have been framed and hung on the clubhouse walls. Were the 125 anniversary celebrations relatively low-key which might explain why no photographs of the occasion were visible to the naked eye. It would be nice to access photos taken to mark the occasion and also obtain a description of the function(s) held.

## Victory celebration

On 28<sup>th</sup> December 1998 Chaminda Vaas led the Colts to victory over the SSC in the limited overs final. Thawfeeq describes the game.

### Vaas leads Colts to first one-day title

Sri Lanka fast bowler Chaminda Vaas handed his club, Colombo Colts CC a Yuletide Christmas present on their 125th anniversary year when he led them to a comprehensive 60 runs victory over Singhalese SC in the Premier limited overs final played under lights at the R. Premadasa Stadium on Saturday.

The win gave Colts their first-ever limited overs title and it was their first one in a major tournament since beating SSC to win the division I Sara trophy under Hemantha Devapriya in 1991-92.

Colts lived up to the exceptional form they had shown throughout the tournament, to rattle up an imposing total of 276 for 6 off 50 overs after chosing to bat first. To chase such a daunting target under lights proved too much for SSC, who eventually succumbed for 216 in 44 overs.

Athough SSC had as many as nine players (the only exceptions being Malintha Perera and Ruchira Perera) who had represented the country in one-day internationals, they were outplayed totally by a clinically efficient side led admirably by Vaas.

Vaas' advice to his players: "Let's play good cricket all the time" and the high standards he set for them were followed to the very letter in Colts' success.

The club lost a key player in all-rounder Tilan Samaraweera (who switched over to SSC), but they hardly felt his loss because of the vast amount of young talent they had waiting on the sidelines.

Naturally, with promising players like Bathiya Perera, Sujith Janaka, Ajantha Lankatilake, Ishara Amarasinghe, Monto Perera and Trevin Matthews breathing down their backs for recognition the first team players knew they had to perform to be retained.

The pace set by national wicket-keeper Romesh Kaluwitharana and Dulip Samaraweera in providing a substantial opening stand of 123 off 20 overs against a probable Sri Lankan fast bowling line-up of Pramodya Wickremasinghe, Nuwan Zoysa and Ruchira Perera gave Colts the launch pad for their lavish total. The final touches to the score line was provided by Vaas and Erik Upashantha who added a breezy 63 for the seventh wicket at more than a run a ball. SSC's batting became a cropper to the left-arm spin of Dinuka Hettiaratchi on the slow surface. Backed up by sharp fielding, none of their top order batsmen were allowed to make a substantial contribution which was a requirement if they were to successfully chase Colts' total.

Hettiaratchi finished with the excellent figures of 6 for 43, but the choice of 'Man of the Final' by adjudicator and match referee Ashantha de Mel went to Vaas, one which no one would grudge.

## Joyful news

About 2000 the chronicler hosted former classmate Sarath Abeysundera with whom he played a few second XI games at Royal College in the mid-sixties. Abeysundera is the chairman/Representative for Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) for the United Kingdom and Europe. He also owns a cricket ground at Leicester.

During the conversation had over a meal, Abeysundera remarked that the Colts had won the first division cricket premiership and had cricketers of the calibre of Vaas in the side. This was the first inkling the chronicler had that the Colts was no longer the club he imagined it to be. As the news sank in the chronicler asked to Abeysundera to repeat what he said, afraid that his leg was being pulled.

## A triumphant end to the decade

The Colts were premiership runners up and champions in 1998-99 and 1999-2000 respectively. The club had truly cemented its reputation as a club that took itself seriously and was taken seriously by other clubs.

As far back as the seventies there were glimpses of what the club could achieve which players like Kumar Ramanthan leading the way. But consistency was lacking.

But in the nineties the club achieved the professionalism and self-belief that had eluded it for quite a while. This was the cricket culture that stalwarts like Douglas Lieversz and Trevor Jansz dreamed of establishing but whose hopes were eluding by the lack of resources and an ability to attract the best cricketers. Jansz always followed the progress of the club and the news filtering through regarding the club's cricketing achievements would have warmed the cockles of his heart. The club was finally now in the place that he and others wanted it to be several decades ago.

There is an unsung hero behind the club's success who only appears in one of the group photos featured in this chapter. He is Ranjit Samarasekera. He was a member of the 1962-63 side that narrowly lost the Sara trophy. He knew what the club could achieve with the right talent and attitude. He set out to create the right recruitment process and instil in players tapped from around the country the belief that their personal glory and the glory of the club were intertwined.

It was good that he was made first division captain in 1972. If he hadn't he probably have left the club in anger and denied the club his services as an administrator. As it turned out he and Nathanielsz were around to see the club finally come good and their devotion and loyalty rewarded.

Carlton Bernadus had taken over as coach from Samarasekera in 1997. Roy Dias took over as coach when Bernadus commenced a nine-year stint as the Bangladeshi under 19 coach. (Apparently the Club won the under 23 tourney in 1997-98 and the R. Premadasa trophy with Bernadus as coach. This needs to be clarified.)

# More information required

There must be many players and administrators of the Colts who collected news clippings and kept statistics on the games played in the nineties. This chapter needs such information to enhance it with analyses of individual performances.

It may be too much to expect yearly averages and scorebooks to turn up. But anecdotal information will come in very useful and can make a big difference to the quality of this account of the nineties, a very important decade in the history of the club.

Gamini Goonasena, now domiciled in Melbourne, was president of the club for the entire decade. He should consider writing his memoirs and providing a subjective account of developments at the club, both on and off the field.
